Tampon Tuesday:

650 menstrual hygiene products were donated, which is equivalent to approximately \$6,500 worth of product. Collection points included Shoppers Drug Mart, Regina Public Library, The Lingerie Shoppe and Hello Baby. The products were distributed to various partner agencies.

StoryWalk:

The Regina Region Family Literacy Hub hosted 17 StoryWalk's. StoryWalk[®] is an innovative and delightful way for children and adults to enjoy reading and the outdoors at the same time.

Mother's Day Bouquet:

Wascana Flower Shoppe hosted a fundraiser for us. Proceeds from the flower sales went towards Women United Regina, to support the committee's collective effort towards a whole community focus on Grade 3 reading.

Volunteers:

Canada Life and IG Wealth Management volunteers helped build School Readiness Kits. The kits were filled with fun literacy tools for children and families to engage in learning over the summer months, the kits were delivered to our school partners.

Virtus Group, ISC, Harvard Western Insurance and Harvard Property packed hundreds of Good Food Boxes for our Summer Success campers.

Community Volunteer Income Tax Program:

Thanks to the support of SaskTel Pioneers and the Canada Revenue Agency, many low-income people from Regina and surrounding area benefited from the free income tax return preparation offered at United Way. In 2022 the volunteers filed 2,863 income tax and benefits returns this year with \$12,228,267 in benefits to be received by tax filers in Saskatchewan over the coming year.

All That Kids Can Be

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Early development – from childhood to adulthood – is a strong predictor of future success. Unfortunately, too many kids face barriers to achieving Childhood Success. United Way Regina believes education is a cornerstone for success. We are fighting to shift the odds so tomorrow's leaders can build a strong foundation today.

Outcomes

- **92.6% of children** showed improvement in behaviour and impulse control
- 86.8% of children with improvement in language/communication and cognitive development
- **95% of children** showed improvement in gross and fine motor skills
- 82.7% of kids and youth improved their school attendance or engagement at school
- **59% of youth** accumulated enough high school credits to stay on track for graduation
- **Invested in programming** to help 246 children improve school readiness

- 1,370 home visits completed
- 11,713 meals served
- 378 referrals made
- 23,286 snacks
- **32** specialty services that are culturally appropriate delivered

Circle Project Assoc. Inc. provides cultural connections for kids, which helps create positive cultural environments and activities where children build cultural pride and self-esteem as a building block to success in school.

"N.D. is a 3 year old Indigenous female who lives with her Kokum. This year she was moved up from the toddler group to the programming group in December 2021. At first she wasn't interested in any of the stories or activities. She wasn't able to sit still for longer than 2-3 minutes at a time. Over time, we have seen remarkable growth in her development. By the end of June, 2022 she can now recite numbers from 1-12, the days of the week, most of her animals and some nouns in Cree. She can recite the Cree prayer and she can now sing close to 2 versus of Oh Canada.

Poverty to Possibility

People who lack necessities like food and shelter can't get ahead in life. Those that struggle to find work or manage their finances aren't able to reach their full potential. The following investments were made to help people move out of the cycle of poverty.

Outcomes

- **98%** of individuals surveyed reported an increase in eating healthy
- **91%** of individuals surveyed reported having increased access to affordable food
- **57%** of individuals surveyed reported increased access to nutritious food.
- Invested in programming that distributed 8,706 Good Food Boxes


Outputs

- 110 educational materials distributed
- 1,445 counselling sessions conducted
- 2,315 meals served

Rainbow Youth Centre Inc. provides youth aged 11-25 an opportunity to learn how to eat healthy nutritious meals with a minimal budget.

"An 11 year old youth is building conscientiousness for being kind to all they meet. They started attending the Youth CARE program at Rainbow Youth Centre 3 weeks after they turned 11 years old. They accessed the supper program regularly and during the agency's family style, sit-down meal they talked about science, their culture, and their dad who is a single parent caring for three children.

From their 11 year old perspective, being able to eat here and take leftovers home is a mission for them. They want everyone in their family to be able to "eat good", adding that sometimes there is not enough food in their house for everyone. Not only are they able to "eat good", they are demonstrating a future where caring and community mindfulness is moving people from poverty to possibility."

Healthy People, Strong Communities

The strength of a community is in the wellbeing of the people who live there. Everyone – no matter who they are or where they live – needs the chance to reach their full potential. United Way helps people in our community access and navigate the resources they need the most through 211 Saskatchewan or access to crisis intervention. Through strategic investments, we help people manage life's challenges and gain a sense of belonging in the place they call home.

Outcomes

- 84% of children, youth and families reported less exposure to violence in their household
- **89% of children, youth and families** were supported during a crisis intervention
- 85.5% of children, youth and families reported improved mental state, including reduced anxiety and distress
- 82% of children, youth and families reported feeling less isolation or loneliness

Outputs

- 13,677 counselling sessions conducted
- 687 home visits completed
- 5,238 meals served
- 9,568 meals/ food hampers/ certificates provided to vulnerable groups, when and where needed
- 31,964 referrals made
- 34,890 served
- 5,007 shelter spaces provided
- 641 snacks
- 968 specialty services that are culturally appropriate delivered
- 2,399 transports
- 4,131 workshops/instructional classes taught

Regina Open Door Society's program, Families in Transition (FIT) provides specialized services, strategies, referrals, and resources to newcomers experiencing long-term integration issues/ barriers, caused by a lack of safety and mental health supports.

"I was connected with the FIT program at just the right time. I came looking for counseling after losing my mother, which caused anxiety like I have never experienced. Michelle is always very attentive, kind, thoughtful and compassionate. She has helped me understand the thoughts and emotions surrounding that situation and helped me to work through my anxiety. I am thankful for her expertise and her kind words. What a value this program has been!" – Yasmin (Age: 22, PR-Immigrant, Referred to program to get support with managing her debilitating grief)

Campaign for Grade Level Reading

Regina's Campaign for Grade-Level Reading is based on the belief that schools cannot succeed alone. When our community pulls together, we can ensure more children in low-income families succeed in school and stay on track to high school graduation. United Way Regina and its tremendous supporters are mobilizing to remove barriers, expand opportunities and assist parents in fulfilling their role as full partners in the academic success of their children. The Campaign focuses on four key priorities: Promoting School Readiness, Expanding Access to books and Literacy Materials, Tackling Chronic Attendance, and Improving Summer Learning.

School Readiness



- 4 Kinder Camps delivered to 2 School Divisions engaging 12 teachers
- 46 campers supported
- 460 books distributed
- 46 backpacks full of school supplies distributed
- 460 nutritious lunches provided to campers
- 92 food boxes provided to support the entire family
- 35 eye exams completed for campers to reduce health-related barriers to learning
- 4 children received full funding support for recommended interventions that would not have otherwise been possible
- 100% of campers maintained or improved their reading behaviours
- 350 Kinder Readiness Kits full of tools and resources deployed to every registered incoming kindergartener

Access to Books



- A total of 13 classroom libraries implemented in 5 schools
- 1,768 Indigenous titles placed into classroom libraries
- 8,133 additional titles added into classroom libraries
- 1,226 tokens for improvement in reading were earned for the Book Vending Machine
- 40 volunteers supported 5 weeks of one-on-one reading through virtual mentoring
- 251 completed virtual mentoring sessions
- 125.5 reading & volunteer hours invested
- 24 students improved their reading levels through virtual mentoring
- 45 reading levels improved in total through virtual mentoring
- 10,000 scholastic books infused into all 12 priority community schools

Attendance



- 1,956 books filled in 4 new book vending machines placed in 4 community schools
- 2,232 books restocked in 4 existing book vending machines
- 12 Read Across Regina celebrations participated in Read Across Regina Day and were presented with literacy themed bags that included brand new books
- **325 primary grade students** participated and were presented with literacy themed bags that included brand new books
- 16,844 books read across our 12 winning classrooms
- 127 tokens for improvement in attendance were earned for the Book Vending Machine
- 2,295 pickups scheduled for the Attendance Matters Van over 168 school days
- 82 individual students (56 families) were support by the Attendance Matters Van to reduce transportation barriers and chronic absence

Summer Slide



- 9 Summer Success Camps delivered to 2 School Divisions engaging 27 teachers
- 124 students supported
- 1,240 books distributed
- 124 backpacks full of school supplies distributed
- 1,240 nutritious lunches provided to students
- 248 food boxes provided to support the entire family
- 98% of students maintained or improved their reading levels

Additional Highlights

- 144 touchscreen laptops,
 96 headsets and 12 rolling storage carts were deployed out to primary grades in each of our 12 community schools
- 831 tokens were earned by students who demonstrated kindness, leadership and respect
